Sergio Gomez is a Chicago based visual artist. He received a Master of Fine Arts degree from Northern Illinois University. As an art student at Governors State University, Sergio was recipient of the Lincoln Laureate Medallion Award given by the Lincoln Academy and former Governor of Illinois Mr. Jim Edgar. Sergio's work has been subject of solo exhibitions in the United States, Italy and Vienna. He has participated in numerous group exhibitions in Spain, Sweden, Mexico and the US. His work can be found in private and public

collections of the National Museum of Mexican Art, Brauer Art Museum, and the MIIT Museo Internazionale Italia Arte among others.

The human form is the most important element in Sergio's work and it exists as an anonymous representation of the self. The figure dominates the work and it is depicted as a shadow, aura, ghost or energy light. Sergio is interested in the human and spiritual experience throughout the cycles of life.

Presently, Sergio Gomez is the Director of Exhibitions at the Zhou B. Art Center, owner & director of 33 Contemporary Gallery, contributor for Italia Arte Magazine, founder of VisualArtToday.com; a curated online exhibition space for international contemporary art. In addition, Sergio is an accomplished graphic designer, Art/ Design faculty at South Suburban College, Creative Consultant for Idea Seat Marketing and Advertising and co-founder of 3C Wear LLC.

As a curator, Sergio has organized numerous important exhibitions such as "The National Self-Portrait Exhibition", "Get Real: New Figurative Realism in Chicago" "CelebrARTE", "Chicago's Twelve", "Chicago's Twelve at Garfield Park Conservatory", "Style Bombing" and the "National Wet Paint Biannual MFA Exhibition" which has become a catalyst for emerging painters across the country. Additionally, Sergio has established international art collaborations in Italy, Austria, Mexico, Spain, Chile and China.

RAW Beauty examines the human figure in its states of change. In a culture that glorifies physical perfection and often creates deceiving images of beauty, the works in this issue explore the opposite side of accepted physical perfection. The works were selected for their ability to embody the true stages of change in the human form. From facial wrinkles that come with age to physical irregularities, these works will give justice and a humanized platform to an often hidden beauty that exists in the other side of our television screen. Each work elevates the raw beauty of the human form without the deceiving glamour of a make-up artist or a digitally manipulated image. RAW celebrates the beauty of the human form often found in the ordinary aspects of our constant states of change.

Although Jennifer Balkan had drawn all her life, she didn't embrace her passion to paint until 2001. Jennifer grew up in one of the countless suburbs of New Jersey in between the Holland Tunnel and the Jersey Shore which spawned an obsession with the Ferris wheel, arcade games, funnel cake and all other Boardwalk decadence. She studied behavioral neuroscience at Lehigh University in Pennsylvania. After graduation, Jennifer worked her way out west to Seattle after a brief stay in Boulder where she worked in a rat lab and found people not afraid to speak their minds. In Seattle, Jennifer worked serving the mentally ill and developmentally disabled population. From Seattle, she was pulled to Austin to study Latin American sociology at the University of Texas. Jennifer attained her Ph.D. in 2001 after conducting anthropological fieldwork on human migration in Chiapas, Mexico in 1999. Although her experience in Mexico was rich, she longed for artistic creativity. In 2002, Jennifer quit her full-time job doing social scientific research and threw herself into oil painting and now paints fervently. She has taken art classes at Laguna Gloria Art School in Austin, the Austin Fine Arts School and at the Art Students League in Denver. She currently paints full-time and teaches painting classes to groups in her studio.



Miranda Graham, a native of Canton, Illinois, received her Bachelor's Degree in Fine Art from The School of the Art Institute in Chicago and her Master of Fine Arts under full scholarship, in painting, from Kendall College of Art & Design.

Graham is currently working as an adjunct professor with Ferris State University. Before attending Graduate school, Graham worked as a Program's Coordinator (Galleries Curator/Manager & Educator), for The Peoria Art Guild, in Peoria, IL for nearly four years. With a long career in public service & community collaborative art outreach, Graham specialized in expanding creative skill sets for the developmentally delayed and youth in crisis in the Chicago area.

Working primarily in oils, her paintings combine contemporary portraiture with vibrant color palettes to challenge formal assumptions about beauty. From small paintings of tooth decay to large scale, in-your-face hands, with missing fingers or distorted joints, these works bring a sense of dignity and heroic triumph to an otherwise discarded truth about our own humanity by examining physical imperfections with a passionate and personal encounter.







Cesar Santos (b. 1982), Cuban-American.

His art education is worldly, and his work has been seen around the globe, from the Annigoni Museum in Italy and the Beijing museum in China to Chelsea NY.

Santos studied at Miami Dade College, where he earned his associate in arts degree in 2003. He then attended the New World School of the Arts before traveling to Florence, Italy. In 2006, he completed the Angel Academy of Art in Florence studying under Michael John Angel, a student of artist Pietro Annigoni.

Santos' work reflects both classical and modern interpretations juxtaposed within one painting. His influences range from the Renaissance to the masters of the nineteenth century to Contemporary Art. With superb technique, he infuses a harmony between the natural and the conceptual to create works that are provocative and dramatic.






(the 1980s punk scene, street performers). Those influences constantly linger in his work today.

But it wasn't until he finished art school at SUNY Purchase at the age of 20 that Betko made his way to Brooklyn, and "was in love right from the start," as he puts it. It was here that he developed his artistic polish, producing works that evoke moments of solitude and otherness within the kinetic rumble of New York. His most recent show, at the Dacia Gallery last summer, presented a series of intimate portraits of creative New Yorkers caught in various moments of contemplation and brought a good amount of well deserved attention to his work.



Riva Lehrer (b. Cincinnati 1958) has exhibited in museums and galleries across the country. Her work focuses on issues of physical identity and the socially challenged body.

Ms. Lehrer's work has been seen in venues including the United Nations, the National Museum of Women in the Arts in Washington, DC, the Arnot Museum, the DeCordova Museum, the Frye Museum, the Smithsonian Museum, the Chicago Cultural Center, the State of Illinois Museum, and the Elmhurst Museum. She has been a visiting artist and lecturer across the US and Europe.

Her work with graphic novelist Alison Bechdel is the subject of a 2012 documentary, "The Paper Mirror", by Charissa King-O'Brien, and is currently being shown in film festivals around the world. A 2005 documentary "Self Preservation: The Art of Riva Lehrer" by David Mitchell and Sharon Snyder has been seen at numerous film fests, winning awards and becoming included in many university curricula. She is also in 2 upcoming documentaries; "Variations" by Laurie Little and Anuradha Rana; and "Code of the Freaks" by Salome Chasnoff, Carrie Sandahl, and Susan Nussbaum.


Awards include the 2009 Prairie Fellowship at the Ragdale Foundation and 2009 the Critical Fierceness Grant, the 2008 Three Arts Foundation of Chicago grant for artistic achievement, and the 2006 Wynn Newhouse Award for Excellence, based in New York City, an unrestricted grant for \$50,000. Other awards include those from the Illinois Arts Council, the University of Illinois and the National Endowment for the Arts.

Ms. Lehrer's writing and visual art are included in the new anthology, "Sex and Disability", Duke University Press, edited by Robert McRuer and Anna Mollow, 2011.

Riva Lehrer is currently adjunct professor at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago (Drawing and Anatomy), visiting artist in Medical Humanities at Northwestern University, and co-chair of the Chicago Bodies of Work Festival 2013.
